## FOREWORD TO THE REPORT

We present the 2021 Annual Report of the Manly-Warringah Rugby League Football Club (MWRLFC).

We are proud to produce the Report as has been done every year since 1946, including the statistics for all grades. We believe we owe it to every player who pulls on the Manly-Warringah Sea Eagles jersey to have their name and other details recorded in this document, whether they played one game or 300 games.

By producing this report, we do not purport to represent ourselves as the Manly Warringah Sea Eagles Limited (MWSE Ltd) which is a separate legal entity administering and funding the Team.

The MWRLFC is a minority owner of the MWSE Ltd. That means that MWRLFC members also have an ownership stake in the MWSE Ltd, the Sea Eagles.

The MWRLFC holds the Preference Share in the Manly-Warringah Sea Eagles Ltd which gives our members, through their right to vote, determination over the Team's name, colours and its home ground, as well as two voting positions on the MWSE Ltd Board which has seven members.

2021 was a quieter year for us. Like many organisations, the ongoing COVID situation has taken its toll on our board professionally and personally, but we certainly have plans for a better and stronger 2022. As Mark Bryant says in his Golden Eagles Report, we look forward with optimism to a better 2022.

We continue to be pleased that our membership numbers remain strong, despite the many personal challenges faced by our members.

It is more important that ever that we maintain our strength as an organisation. We need our membership numbers to be strong so our place within the Sea Eagles structure and the voice of our members (Sea Eagles fans) cannot be ignored should there ever be future changes to the ownership or governance of the Sea Eagles.

As we always do, we encourage MWRLFC members wherever possible and affordable, to also be members of the Sea Eagles.

This report has largely been compiled from publicly available data and our own records with all photography credits to the Sea Eagles. We thank all the contributors for their reports. The production of the Report is done on a voluntary basis and the cost of printing the Report is wholly funded by the MWRLFC through the membership income.

We thank Des Hasler and his wonderful team for an exciting 2021 that has given us all a lot to enjoy through difficult times and a lot to look forward to in 2022.

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



I am pleased to once more present the Annual Report of the Manly-Warringah Rugby League Football Club for 2020.

### The 2021 Season

What a year 2021 was – our 75th year in the top-grade competition.

There were incredible highs - the Sea Eagles had many memorable wins, finished the regular season in the top four and were one game away from the Grand Final.

Sadly, on the other hand, we lost one of our most famous and influential figures of our 75-year history in Bob Fulton – a rugby league Immortal and Life Member of the MWRLFC. We pay tribute to Bob in this Report. Very sadly, we also lost our first Premiership winning captain and local junior Fred Jones who passed away in March. Fred was one of the great characters of our game and a true local hero.

The promise of 2021 certainly looked bright when the Sea Eagles launched their season campaign in Manly on 3 March. The flags at Manly along the iconic beachfront celebrating our players across the 75 years were inspirational and for me, as one of those many players featured, humbling.

The promise seemed to evaporate at the start of the season with four consecutive losses to the Roosters, Rabbitohs, Panthers and Dragons. The team looked down on confidence and nothing seemed to go our way. We lost forwards Andrew Davey and Morgan Boyle to season ending injuries in the early rounds. The critics piled on and the word wooden spoon was mentioned more than once.

But it was a clutch field goal from DCE in game five against the Warriors that sparked our comeback. With the winless tag behind them the team arrived in Mudgee in round six running 15th on the ladder to play the Titans who were sitting in seventh spot. Well, what a day that was! With the previous week's win under their belt and the return of Tommy Turbo in awesome form all the potential of the team clicked into place, and we enjoyed a 36-nil rout over our opposition. Our steady climb up the NRL ladder had begun. We followed that up with a very satisfying thrashing of the Tigers and put on a highly competitive performance against the undefeated Panthers in Bathurst. Two more wins followed against the Warriors and the Broncos in Magic Round where we notched up 50 points, only conceding one converted try.

Then on the Sunday morning of our match against our old foes Parramatta at fortress Bankwest Stadium, where they were second on the ladder having lost only one game, we heard the news about Bob. It was hard to know how the team would respond to this distressing news, but respond they did, with one of most steely and superb performances of the year. They honoured him in the way he would have most appreciated with a 28-6 victory. It was truly one for Bob and one for the ages. And it disproved what was said incorrectly on many occasions, that we hadn't beat a top four team all year.

We put in a flat performance against Newcastle resulting in a frustrating loss, but after a week off came back into scintillating form and put together three huge wins against the Cowboys, Titans and a 66-nil thrashing of the Bulldogs. A disappointing loss to the Raiders in round 17 was followed by three more outstanding wins against the Dragons, Tigers and the Sharks. The Storm got us again in Round 21, but we bounced back with another thrashing of the Eels, edged over the top of the Raiders with another DCE field goal and a win against the Bulldogs. We finished the season with a big win against Cowboys including the 80th minute try of the year to Tom Trbojevic at the back end of superb effort and skills from Reuben Garrick and DCE.

Thanks to our for and against, we pushed the Roosters into fifth spot and finished the year in the top four for the first time since 2014. Our finals campaign got off to a poor start when we were outplayed by the Storm. Our second bite at the cherry saw us see off the Roosters in style with a 42-6 boilover. Our next adversary for a place in the grand final was the Rabbitohs. Had we scored just one of the two disallowed tries in that game we may well have found ourselves playing in the Grand Final, but it was not to be. Our season ended 36-16.

Overall though, it was a great season. We were treated to some fine individual and team performances across the park. As well as Tom's stellar year, we got to enjoy the sight and speed of Jason Saab in full flight, the famous Josh Schuster no look pass, the incredible skills of young Haumole Olakau'atu and the return home of Club favourite Kieran Foran taking his place once more alongside DCE.

Congratulations to Head Coach Des Hasler, his coaching team, the whole football department and of course each and every player for a great season.

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

### 2021 – the Year of Tom

It was an extraordinary year for Tommy Turbo. What started so badly for him ended up the making of him as a player and leader. His list of individual achievements and honours are extraordinary, not least of which was his crowning as Dally M Player of the Year, having played just 18 games of the regular season.

### Records

2021 was a season which saw Club records tumbling, including Tom Trbojevic breaking the longstanding record of most number of tries in a season previously held by the legend Phil Blake since 1983. Reuben Garrick broke two of Matthew Ridge's records for most goals kicked in a premiership season and highest scorer in a premiership season. This has required considerable updating of the records page!

### Junior Elite Pathways

Our junior representatives had an outstanding year. The Harold Matthews team won their Grand Final for the second time in three years and the SG Ball were one game away from playing in the Grand Final. You can read about the season in Pathways Manager Kristie Fulton's report. Congratulations to all involved.

### Farewells

Sadly, we farewell some very popular players – Curtis Sironen (St Helens), Moses Suli (Dragons), Cade Cust (Wigan), Jack Gosiewski (Dragons), Tevita Funa (NSW Waratahs) and Zac Saddler (Brisbane train and trial). We thank them all and wish them all the very best in their future careers.

### 2022 – Looking forward

There can be much to be optimistic about for season 2022. Our young players will be all the better for the experience and with minimal changes to the squad next year, the stability will be important. Our young pathways players continue to come through the ranks and we can expect to see the debuts of Sione Fainu, Tolutau Koula and Alec Tu'itavake, the continuing development of Gordon Chan Kum Tong, Jamie Humphreys and Kaeo Weekes, along with more games featuring 2021 debut player Ben Trbojevic. The squad will also be joined by young Queensland forward Ethan Bullemor.

We also look forward to the completion and opening of the Sea Eagles Centre of Excellence at the northern end of 4 Pines Park/Brookvale Oval. The Centre of Excellence is the culmination of years of lobbying all levels of government for funding going right back to 2013. The Football Club board acknowledges the efforts of Club Co-Patron Kerry Sibraa's role in the earlier years of this project and to the respective CEOs who landed the funding. The Sea Eagles Centre of Excellence will add both new, state of the art training facilities for our players and coaches as well as undercover seating for our supporters with great views of the game. Importantly, the work includes a full replacement of the playing surface which will transform it into being the best in the competition. There is also optimism about potential future government funding announcements that would finally see Brookvale Oval developed into a world class boutique suburban ground our Club and fans deserve.

### The Board

As for many of our members, 2021 was a difficult and interrupted year on a personal level for members of our Board. As I point out each and every year, we work on a voluntary basis and our purpose is to serve our loyal members and uphold the role of our organisation which is to preserve the important traditions and heritage of our Club. I want to thank the members of my Board – Alan Thompson, David O'Donnell, Julie Sibraa, Scotty Wilcox, Nick Curulli and Alf Czarn for their work and their support over the year.

Finally, to you our loyal and committed members, thank you for continuing your membership. I wish you a safe and happy Christmas and look forward to seeing you at Brookvale Oval next year.

## SEA EAGLES CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S MESSAGE



2021 was another year full of challenges, compromises and adjustment for everyone. Thankfully for all Sea Eagles members and supporters, it was also a year full of excitement and entertainment as we watched our team fight back from a difficult first month of the season to re-establish their credibility and then go on to become a genuine contender for the title.

We are incredibly proud of how our players and staff as well as their partners and families adapted to the decision by the NRL to immediately relocate the competition to South East Queensland in July. This pro-active decision and the excellent logistics management by the NRL and Clubs saved our competition and provided much needed entertainment, particularly for those of us living through long periods of lockdown restrictions.

As members and supporters, we look for our team to demonstrate a number of traits and deliver outcomes beyond the ultimate premiership success which of course we all seek. From the many conversations I've had with supporters on this topic, the things they look for include 100% effort, commitment, character, improvement, and entertainment. Our team gave us all of those things and whilst we finished one week short of adding to our impressive tally of 19 Grand Finals in our 75 years, we are all proud of the way we stuck together, maintained belief and trust in each other and overcame the challenges of what ended up being a very positive and memorable year.

Our star fullback, Tom Trbejovic, had what many judges have described as the most dominant individual season ever produced. At our end of season awards event, Tom took out the Roy Bull Best and Fairest Player award, the Player's Player award and the Gordon Willoughby Medal as the Sea Eagles Members Player of the Year. He was also named the Brad Fittler Medal winner as the NSW Blues Player of the Origin Series and the Wally Lewis Medal as the overall Player of the Origin Series. To cap off a truly remarkable year, Tom was also named the Players Champion as voted by his peers across the entire game and at the prestigious Dally M Awards event, he was named the Dally M Fullback of the Year and received the ultimate accolade of being crowned the Dally M Player of the Year for 2021.

Rueben Garrick also had an amazing year becoming the first player to notch 20 tries and 100 goals in the one season and he went on to break Hazem El Masri's 2004 record for the most points scored in a single NRL season. Rueben finished the regular season with a phenomenal 304 points and was deservedly named in the 2021 Dally M Team of the Year.

The Sea Eagles Pathway Academy exists to develop young talent into potential Manly NRL players and into fine young men in the process. The Academy continues to deliver great results with over a third of our top 30 squad now being graduates of our successful programme. We expect, and are planning for, the number of Sea Eagles Academy players graduating into the NRL squad to steadily increase over the coming years. Our Harold Matthews Cup team had an outstanding year, winning their competition and remaining undefeated along the way. Our SG Ball side also had a strong year going down in a close encounter in the preliminary final to the Raiders who went on to win the competition. Unfortunately, the Jersey Flegg competition was disappointingly cancelled due to the lockdown restrictions that we experienced through the year.

I'm pleased to confirm that our new Grandstand and Centre of Excellence at 4 Pines Park is progressing well and is on track for an opening early in 2022. With over 3000 seats all under the cover of a huge polycarbonate roof, our supporters on gameday will enjoy great comfort, brilliant viewing and the convenience of brand new amenities. We will also greatly benefit from the state of the art facilities of the Centre of Excellence which will assist Head Coach, Des Hasler, and his dedicated team of professionals, in preparing our players to the highest possible standards. The further and complete development of 4 Pines Park remains a top priority. Sea Eagles supporters specifically and the Northern Beaches community generally, deserve a modern boutique stadium and will continue to work with the NRL and all levels of Government to make this happen.

I would like to thank all Sea Eagles members and MWRLFC members for your wonderful support. I do hope you enjoyed what we delivered this year and you can be assured that we are working hard to bring more enjoyment and success in 2022 and beyond.

On behalf of everyone at the Sea Eagles, I send my very best wishes for a very happy and healthy Christmas and New Year. I look forward to seeing you at the footy.

## HEAD COACH'S REPORT

The season that was 2021... what a rollercoaster the past year has been. As a club we endured so much but kept getting up to face the next challenge.

You can never prepare for the terrible tragedy the club experienced in November 2020 with the passing of one of our players, Keith Titmuss. An incredibly sad and unexpected moment that still lives within us all. Keith, the person he was and his family who have been so strong through an unbelievably difficult time, formed a powerful force that underpinned our resilience to adversity and the hurdles we faced throughout the year. His spirit will continue to empower this group for many years to come.

Once we got through a torrid pre-season, both on and off the field, the season proper was upon us. To say we started below our expectations is a massive understatement. Our early season performances on the field, did not reflect the hard work we did throughout the summer and were continuing to do each week. Most importantly the belief within the club and the football department in particular remained strong.

The decision we made as a group was not to let our 80 minutes on a weekend shape our week, but to let our week shape our 80 minutes. In Round 5, against a resilient and determined opposition in the NZ Warriors we did just that and won a closely fought game in the final seconds. This was to be the catalyst for us to kick-start some performances that will long be remembered as some of the best this club has produced.

Some fantastic team performances against the Titans in Mudgee, and on Anzac Day against the Tigers before a narrow loss in Bathurst to eventual premiers the Panthers, helped reinforce that we were on the right track.

On Sunday 23rd May the club and the game lost a legend in the shape of Immortal, Bob Fulton. His contribution to the Sea Eagles will remain unrivalled and the team pulled together after learning of his passing on the bus on the way to the ground to produce a win against the Eels that showed all of the spirit, determination and grit that epitomised Bob and his standing in the game of rugby league.

Covid again played a big part in how our season was run and the NRL made the very difficult decision to move to Queensland to avoid a potential shut down and premature end to the season. It turned out to be the right move for the game, with the season continuing amidst extraordinary adversity.

In our case we relocated to the Sunshine Coast in a matter of days. The upheaval and logistics in organising something of this magnitude so quickly is hard to comprehend. The staff and players really bought in and everyone did their bit to ensure it went as smoothly as possible. To think that just two days later we would be driving 3 + hours down the freeway on game day to take on the Dragons and win without our State of Origin representatives, is a moment I am very proud of and really helped shape the ten weeks that followed.

The opportunity to live amongst one another and some of our families for almost three months was something we embraced. It's rare that anyone gets to share the depth or rapport and quality of relationships we developed together during this time and I'm sure it played a big part in the football you saw the players producing each week.

To finish in the top four after the pre-season and start to the year we endured is an incredible achievement and will hold us in good stead as we commence our 2022 campaign.

It would be remiss of me not to mention some fantastic individual accolades achieved by some of our players this season.

It goes without saying that Tom Trbojevic's contribution to the 2021 NRL season both in club and representative football was simply stunning. The season he had, deserves the highest recognition, and he was duly honoured with the Dally M Medal.

Reuben Garrick is another that had a fantastic year, breaking so many club and whole of game records as the season progressed. I won't name all of his achievements individually as I'm sure many of you know them, but to be the first player to score 300 plus points in a season as well as the first ever to kick more than 100 goals and score more than 20 tries is spectacular and worthy of mention.

Other performers of note, Jason Saab, Josh Schuster, Haumole Olakau'atu, Taniela Paseka and Lachlan Croker who all had wonderful seasons and work hard at their craft to ensure you will continue to see a better and more refined

product. Congratulations also to the following players, Ben Trbojevic, Kurt Deluis, and Zac Saddler on making their NRL debut this year, with club debutantes Josh Aloiai, Christian Tuipulotu, and Karl Lawton also performing well at every opportunity. Finally our captain Daly Cherry - Evans who led brilliantly from the front displaying sharing qualities which go unseen but are so crucial for team success. I could genuinely single out every player from the entire squad, for their effort, attitude and performance throughout the year.

In closing, I want to nominate one moment that typified our 2021 season. It came in the dying seconds of our final round game against the Cowboys in Townsville. The game was won, the siren was sounding and we had a qualifying final to play the following week when Reuben Garrick initiated a 110 metre try, that was nothing short of incredible and was subsequently and deservedly nominated as the Try of the Year.

This is the initiative, belief and capability this group have developed these past few seasons together. It will hold us in good stead as we commence our 2022 preparations and the season ahead will be one to watch and enjoy.

## ELITE PATHWAYS REPORT 2021

### Harold Matthews Cup (Under 17)

This year's Harold Matthews Cup team is the most successful in the history of the club at this level.

The Manly side finished the regular season as undefeated minor premiers. They then went one step further and defeated the Parramatta Eels, 24-12 in the grand final to become the 2021 Harold Matthews Cup Premiers.

The premiership win is the club's second Harold Matthews Cup grand final victory in recent years with the club having won its first grand final in 2018 after losing in extra time in the decider a year earlier. Prior to this period of dominance, in the 47 years of the competition being held, Manly had never contested or won a Harold Matthews Cup premiership. A number of players who represented Manly in these junior representative teams are now playing in the NRL.



To cap off an outstanding season, Latu Fainu was named both Player of the Match and NSW Player of the Year; two remarkable achievements given that Latu was one of the youngest players in the competition at 15 years of age. Captain, Josh Feledy was also recognised as the competition's top try scorer with 20 tries. Josh and Latu joined the Manly Sea Eagles development program at 12 years of age, both having played for Manly junior club, Beacon Hill Bears.

As further acknowledgement of the Sea Eagles impressive season, five players were named in the Under 16 City team – Lehi Hopoate, Latu Fainu (Captain), Roy Quiroz-Mapusua, Mitchell Taotua & Zedrick Tupulua with Samuela Fainu representing the City Under 18 team.

In November, two Harold Matthews Cup players, Latu Fainu and Roy Quiroz-Mapusua were selected in the Emerging Blues Squad. These young men will join Manly NRL players, Jason Saab, Josh Schuster and Haumole Olakau'atu in an Emerging Blues camp in December. Both Josh and Haumole are graduates of Sea Eagles Pathways.

### SG Ball Cup (Under 19)

The 2021 SG Ball Cup campaign was successful with the side reaching the semi-finals this season, continuing the solid performances of our junior representative teams in recent years.

The Sea Eagles Under 19s lost only two games throughout the year by a combined total of 4 points demonstrating the strength of the squad. The team finished the season with the best defence and for and against differential in the competition.

Although there were challenges early with injuries to key players, the younger members of the playing group performed exceptionally well and gained invaluable experience which will put them in good stead for the future.

### Jersey Flegg Cup (Under 21)

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Jersey Flegg Cup competition has been cut short over the last two seasons resulting in minimal game time for players in the Under 21 age group.

### Pathway to the NRL

Heading into the 2022 season, prop Viliami Fifita (NRL Top 30) and NRL development players, Jamie Humphreys (halves), Jacob Sykes (prop) and Gordon Chan Kum Tong (hooker) will join the 12 current NRL players who have originated from our lower grades: Tom Trbojevic, Brad Parker, Keiran Foran, Jake Trbojevic, Taniela Paseka, Josh Schuster, Haumole Olakau'atu, Tolu Koula, Ben Trbojevic, Kaeo Weekes, Alec Tuitavake and Sione Fainu.

The Manly Sea Eagles now boast one of the most successful rugby league pathways programs in the NRL not only related to performance outcomes but evident by the number of players who have made a successful transition to the NRL since 2017.

## JUNIOR LEAGUE REPORT 2021

On behalf of the Board of the Manly Warringah District Junior Rugby Football League, I am pleased to present this report for the 2021 season.

Unfortunately, the 2021 season ended prematurely late June due to the Covid-19 pandemic. This makes two consecutive seasons greatly disrupted by the pandemic. Once again, all our junior league clubs did an exceptional job in getting so many players and teams registered for the 2021 season after the disruption to our 2020 season and with Covid still a major health concern.

This year we had 2,453 players registered which was an increase from 1,983 in 2020 and compared to 2,012 in 2019 and 2,066 in 2018.

There was an increase in female registrations with 350 for 2021 compared to 133 in 2020, 128 in 2019, 90 in 2018 & 37 in 2017.

A total increase in 470 players from last season is a wonderful result especially considering the tremendous difficulties that the Covid-19 pandemic has placed on sport and the community in general. This is a reflection of the great work done by the Club Executives and their volunteers at each of our 12 Clubs.

There were 172 teams in 2021 compared to 149 teams in 2020, 148 in 2019 and 152 in 2018 in our age groups from Under 6 to A Grade.

Harbord Devils entered an Open Age 'A' Grade team for the first time in the Club's history. The North Curl Curl Club had a very successful 90th season celebration at the Dee Why RSL Club during the season. The Narrabeen Sharks are also a foundation Club and achieved their 90th season.

Once again many of our teams played in combined competitions conducted by the NSWRL. The season was cut short mid-season and we were all hopeful that government restrictions would be lifted in time to be able to play the final series for all Competitions, however this did not eventuate with restrictions not being lifted sufficiently until well after our season ended.

Again, there were many Manly junior players playing in the NRL in 2021 notably Manly Sea Eagles players, Tom Trbojevic, Jake Trbojevic and Brad Parker, with Ben Trbojevic making his NRL debut and joining his brothers Tom and Jake. Tom had an outstanding year, taking out the following awards: Dally M Medal, RLPA's Players Champion Medal, the Wally Lewis Medal for being the best player in the State of Origin series and the Brad Fittler Medal (judged to be the best NSW player by his NSW teammates), as well as the Daily Telegraph's People's Choice Award.

It is also important to highlight the financial assistance provided by the Manly Warringah Leagues Club which has supported the M-W Junior Rugby League for many years. The Leagues Club is providing additional funding this year to assist the M-W District Junior League with its 90th Anniversary function. I would like to thank the Leagues Club Board for their contribution and assistance, including use of Club facilities when required. The continued financial support of the Manly Leagues Club is paramount to our District Junior Rugby League.

I would also like to thank the Manly Warringah Rugby League Football Club who provide general corporate guidance and assistance when appropriate.

Thank you to my fellow Board Members for their contributions for the 2021 season as well as all the work and support that both Lauren Coltman and Danielle Kifooti from NSWRL provided to our District Junior League and all our Clubs. Thank you also to our District referees who continue to perform a great service to our District Junior League.

## ROBERT “BOB” FULTON AM (1946 - 2021)

### Tribute

Sunday 23rd of May, 2021 was one of the Club’s saddest days – the day we lost Manly-Warringah Rugby League Football Club Life Member, Sea Eagles player number 175 and Rugby League Immortal Bob Fulton.

Nicknamed “Bozo”, Bob achieved every single accolade possible in Rugby League and can legitimately be known as the Greatest of All Time. He inspired countless players and fans alike to the game. Many’s the Manly fan who when asked why they follow the Sea Eagles would simply say “Bob Fulton”.

Bob came to our Club at the age of 17 thanks to the unrivalled scouting and signing skills of one of our other legendary Club figures, Ken Arthurson AM, who as Club Secretary swooped in once he’d spotted the talent of the fair-haired apprentice-boilermaker from Wollongong playing in the Illawarra Rugby League.

Bob Fulton debuted for the Sea Eagles in 1966 and played 213 first grade games between 1966 and 1976. He played five-eighth and centre. In 1968 Bob led the Manly side as Captain in the Grand Final against Souths. He was the youngest ever captain. Bob won premierships with Manly in 1972, 1973 and in 1976 as Captain in his final game for the Club. He represented Country Seconds: 1965, New South Wales City Firsts: 1967-68, 1970-71, 1973-75, 1978, New South Wales: 1967-69, 1971-75 and 1978 and Australia in both Tests and World Cups between 1967 and 1978, including as Captain leading the 1978 Kangaroos to Ashes success.

After retirement as a player, Bob coached Manly to premiership victory in 1987. He took the team to three consecutive Grand Finals in 1995, 1996 and 1997, with the team taking out the premiership in 1986. He retired as Manly’s coach in 1999.

Bob coached Australia from 1989 to 1998. As Test Coach he continued Australia’s international dominance including World Cup wins in 1992 and 1995. In series against Great Britain (1990 Kangaroos, 1992 Ashes series and 1994 Kangaroos) and against NZ in 1991 Australia was stretched to the deciding Third Test of the series. Thanks to Bob and his ability as a coach and mental toughness Australia went on to win every series.

In 2001 Bob was appointed to the NSW and Australian Selection Panels and was an automatic inclusion into the RL Hall of Fame when it was formed in 2002.

In 1981, he was selected by the publication Rugby League Week as one of the initial four post-war “Immortals” of the Australian game alongside Churchill, Raper and Gasnier. Fulton was also inducted into the Sport Australia Hall of Fame in 1985.[12] In 1994 Fulton was inducted as a Member of the Order of Australia “for service to rugby league football” and in 2000 he received the Australian Sports Medal. In 2002 he was inducted into the Australian Rugby League Hall of Fame.

In February 2008, Fulton was named in the list of Australia’s 100 Greatest Players (1908–2007) which was commissioned by the NRL and ARL to celebrate the code’s centenary year in Australia. Bob went on to be named as an interchange player in Australian rugby league’s Team of the Century. Announced on 17 April 2008, the team is the panel’s majority choice for each of the thirteen starting positions and four interchange players. Respected rugby league commentator Roy Masters, believes he was left off the starting team due to his versatility, making it difficult to put him in just in one position.

In 2008 New South Wales announced their rugby league team of the century also, naming Fulton as a five-eighth.

He was made a life member of the Sydney Cricket Ground and a plaque in the Walk of Honour there commemorates his career. He was a member of the Order of Australia (AM).

Fulton is one of only two people to have gone on four Kangaroo Tours. Fulton toured as a player in 1973 and 1978 and as team coach in 1990 and 1994. The other is Mal Meninga who made four tours as a player on the unbeaten 1982 and 1986 tours and as the team captain under Fulton’s coaching in both 1990 and 1994. He is also the only person to have captained and coached Kangaroos touring teams on separate tours.

Bob was devoted to his family and loyal without fault to those he called his friends. The Manly-Warringah Rugby League Football Club’s heartfelt condolences go out to Ann, Scott, Brett and Kristie as well as his grandchildren, former teammates and friends.



## ROBERT “BOB” FULTON AM (1946 - 2021)

### Vale ‘King Silver’: Manly man and Immortal who put family above all - By Roy Masters (reproduced with permission)

He called me “King Fibro” and I called him “King Silver” and the brutally frank, yet hilarious, text messages we exchanged should be the centrepiece of the obituary of Bob Fulton - one of four inaugural rugby league Immortals - who died in Sydney on Sunday, aged 74.

But “Bozo”, like most real-life clowns, was incredibly private and the messages will die with him.

The prostate cancer that Bob had bravely fought returned late last year and spread to his lungs, yet he attended the funeral of his Manly teammate, Freddy Jones and the wedding of his radio colleague, Ray Hadley, in March, without acknowledging it.

The news of his passing at 12.30pm on Sunday in St Vincents Public Hospital was conveyed to me by Royce Ayliffe, who was at his bedside, along with wife Anne, their children and grandchildren.

Royce, Bozo, his son Brett, Ian Schubert and I were regulars on a twice-yearly trip to the Northern Territory, where we fished and chased wild pigs.

It was on these trips I came to understand the real Bozo. His grandchildren were everything. Perhaps it was growing up without siblings in a small cottage in the Wollongong suburb of Unanderra, having migrated from England at age four, but Bozo adored family. Memories of him showing the grandchildren how to bait a hook, untangle a line and clean a rifle, will endure.

Some say he was aloof, even selfish. But he had a low tolerance for fools and like all great footballers with an inbuilt radar for reading weakness in opponents, he detected duplicity in an instant. If he gave offence, it was because he was a “cut-through” man, never masking his language in obfuscation. His critics say that, given the players available to him as Manly’s coach, he should have won more premierships. To that, I say with some experience, “You don’t know how hard they are to win” and secondly, “You weren’t at the 1995 Rugby League World Cup in England.”

Bozo spent 1995 as the frontman for the ARL in its fight with the News Limited-funded Super League, convincing players to sign with the establishment administration, even orchestrating the return of the “Canterbury Four” to the ARL. His busy workload contributed to him losing the grand final to the Bulldogs and, with most of the top players signed to Super League, he left for England with a second-tier squad of Kangaroos.

He encountered major problems in a tournament where England and New Zealand had signed with News Limited. Training grounds suddenly became unavailable, the press was hostile and the Kangaroos lost the first game against England at Wembley.

In the semi-final against New Zealand at Huddersfield, the penalty count went relentlessly against Australia and Matthew Ridge, the Kiwi fullback but also a member of Bozo’s Manly team, lined up a kick that would have sent the Kangaroos out of the World Cup.

“You owe me one, Ridgey,” Bozo whispered in the coaches’ box and he missed, sending the game to extra time, with Australia triumphing.

Bozo crafted an improbable win at Wembley against England in the final, where Andrew Johns wore No.9 but played first receiver. Geoff Toovey wore No.7, played dummy half and had a sore neck, meaning Johns packed into the scrum.

Bozo thought like a chess player, orchestrating moves well in advance, leaving exasperated rivals saying, “F--- you, Bozo, you’ve done it again to me.”

Yet sometimes, he could utter a comment of searing honesty and personal admission.

On the eve of the 1980 preliminary final, between his Eastern Suburbs team, captained by Ayliffe, and my Western Suburbs team, he set out to debunk what he called the “Fibro myth”.

It was a passionate delivery that ended with Bozo asking the assembled players whether they wanted to live in a fibro house. Having lived in one at Unanderra, he declared he loved his comfortable Manly dwelling and anyone priding themselves on living in fibro homes had poor priorities.

Over the next 40 years, I called him “King Silver” and he teased me as “King of the underclass”, while texting book titles of right-wing media.

Our last conversation was at the time of Tommy Raudonikis’ death, but he was too consumed with sadness at the death of a famous Fibro for any levity.

Yet, if I could guess a message he would send as I write this, it would be, “Just mention I did die in a public hospital.”





## GOLDEN EAGLES REPORT 2021

As another incredibly challenging year draws to an end the Golden Eagles look back on the good times and the bad times, as well as casting an optimistic eye forward to 2022 and beyond.

According to the “experts” Manly started the season as one of the favourites for the wooden spoon. They were being written off by all and sundry after their fourth loss in a row in round 4. However, the Sea Eagles showed the resilience, toughness and ‘never say die’ attitude they are renowned for, coupled with skill, talent and a once in a generation season by superstar Tom Trbojevic and surged to one game from the Grand Final, eventually finishing the season in equal 3rd place. There would be no wooden spoon for the mighty Sea Eagles in their 75th season.

The 2022 season will be one of the most highly anticipated seasons for Sea Eagle fans with most believing the side can improve on this year’s finish, especially with some more exciting youngsters to join Des Hasler’s Top 30 Squad.

Back to this season and off the field it was even more of a challenge with heartbreak on more than one occasion. The start of the off-season in November 2020 had hardly just begun when the tragic news surfaced of up-and-coming star forward Keith Titmuss’ passing following a club training session at Narrabeen. Keith had only just been added to the Top 30 Squad and was anticipated to make his 1st grade debut in 2021 and become a star of the Manly side. Perhaps even bigger than his footballing ability was Keith’s personality and character, making him loved by everyone that met this gentle giant. We can take some solace in the fact that Keith passed whilst pursuing his dreams and doing what he loved. Keith was held in such high regard by the Manly-Warringah Club that he became only the second player (after Jason Annear), to be assigned a Player Number on the club’s registry without playing a 1st grade game. Rest In Peace Sea Eagle #623.

The season had only just started when another tragedy struck the Sea Eagles off the field. One of the Manly club’s toughest and finest competitors Fred Jones passed away at the age of 79. Fred will always have the distinction of being Manly’s first premierships captain in 1972 and he followed that up in 1973 by leading the club to back-to-back premierships to start their amazing run of success throughout the seventies. Fred Jones virtually created the blueprint for toughness and was an inspiration to his team mates on the field and also to his friends and family off the field, where he was regarded as a thorough gentleman. We will miss him at the bar telling stories while enjoying a beer. Rest In Peace Sea Eagle #140.

On the field the team was starting to make winning a regular thing when catastrophic news off the field was reported in the passing of Rugby League Immortal - Robert Fulton. Bob tragically lost a hard-fought battle with cancer in May at the age of 74 and will leave a massive legacy with not just the Sea Eagles but rugby league in general. Bob was one of the first four Immortals named and in the eyes of most fans he was one of the greatest to play the game. His career continued off the field with legendary coaching efforts at all levels of the sport and his continued involvement with junior sport and Manly’s Pathways Program is now starting to show in the top grade. Rest In Peace Sea Eagle #175.

Unfortunately, due to the worldwide pandemic, the Golden Eagles day was cancelled for the second year in a row. The good news is we are optimistically looking forward to Golden Eagles Day in 2022 and with the amazing support and help of our friends at Kay Van Norton-Poche, Industree Group, Manly Money, nicco and Wormald, it promises to be a weekend to mark down in your calendar as soon as the dates are announced.

Plans are underway to make it a Golden Eagles Weekend culminating in a match at Brookvale Oval with hundreds of past players attending. Once again, the day will start at the Leagues Club giving fans the opportunity to mingle with their heroes and then marching to the ground with them. 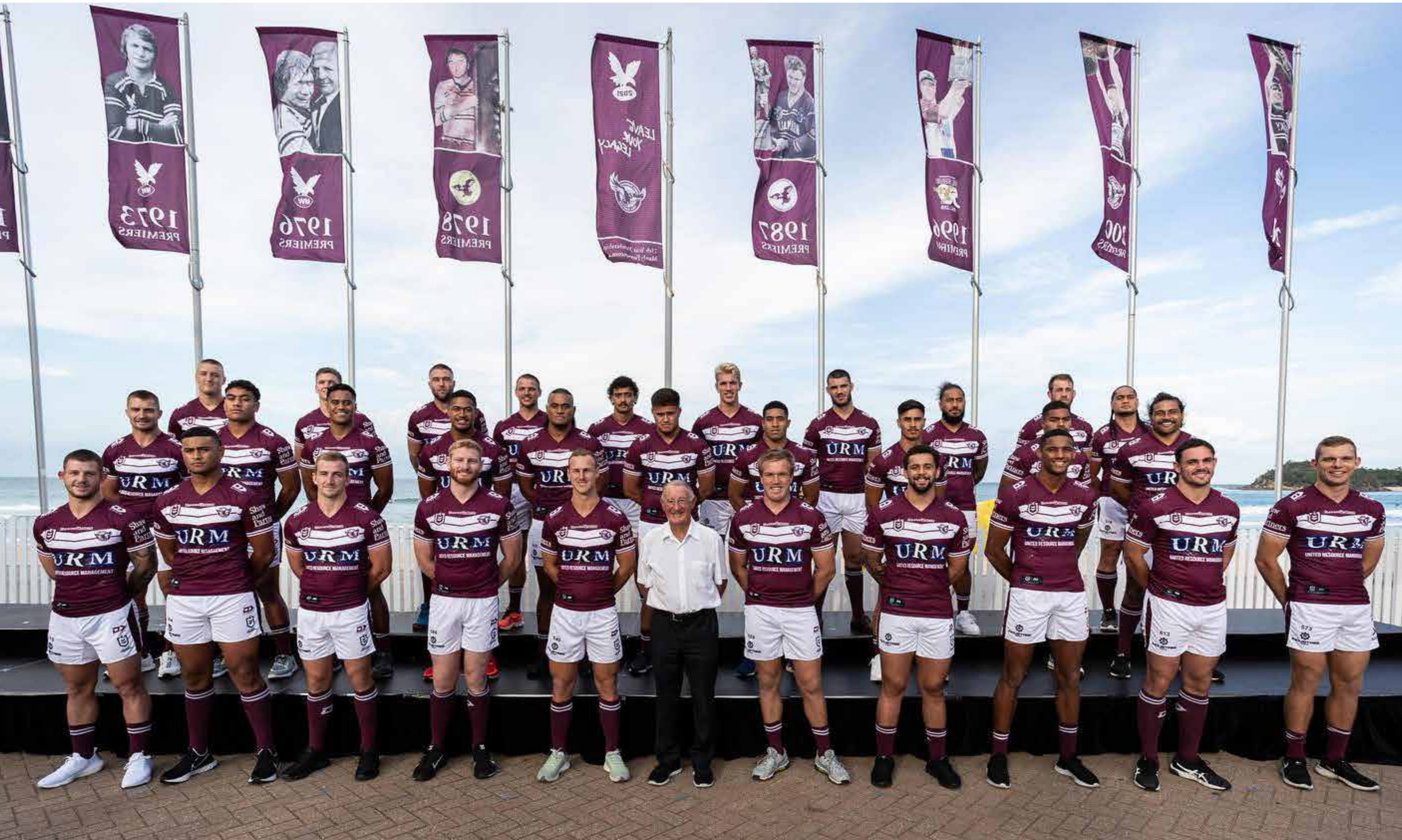

## VALE

### Fred Jones (1942 - 2021) Life Member (1975) Player #140

Fred holds a special place in the pantheon of the all-time greats of the Sea Eagles. He was a local junior, our first Premiership winning captain in 1972 (scoring a try), and a great character of the game. Fred played 241 games during his 14 seasons for Manly between 1961-63 and 1965-1975), scoring 25 tries and 1 field goal, totalling 77 points. In 1964 he played for Tumbalumbar as Captain-Coach, returning to Manly in 1965. In 1973 Fred again Captained the Sea Eagles in their back to back title in the bruising encounter against Cronulla.

Fred had an incredible representative career representing Riverina against France in 1964, City Firsts in 1968, City Seconds 1969-1971, New South Wales 1968-1969 and 1973, Australia in 1968 and 1972.

Off the field Fred was a true gentleman and like many players of the time, had a career - in Fred's case as a wharfie and waterfront foreman. After Fred's passing, Maritime Union National Secretary Paddy Crumlin wrote "Freddy was one of those players that took the old game into the innovations of the new out on the field in a manner that generates great memories, total respect and deep affection for his skills, achievements, leadership, and command of the game from the engine room of the scrum and forward play... Fred took his leadership from the field to stand alongside his workmates for a better and fairer workplace until his retirement, a great asset with the profile Freddy had in the community in those days. I know the modern game deeply appreciate that the love of the game and the hard commitments that came with it did not come with the financial recognition it deserved". RIP Fred

### Norm Bertrand (1933 - 2020) Player #94

Norm was a prop forward and a local junior from Narrabeen who played for the Sea Eagles between 1953-56. Norm made his First-Grade debut on April 17th, 1954 in round 4. Norm played 23 First Grade, 52 Reserve Grade and 5 Third Grade games. In 1954, Norm played in our victorious Reserve Grade Grand Final over South Sydney. Norm was a local tiler on the Northern Beaches and enjoyed playing golf in his spare time.



### Barry O'Connell (1936 - 2021) - Player #131

Barry played his junior league for Bondi Junction before making his First-Grade debut for Easts. In 1960, Barry joined the Sea Eagles as a Five-Eighth and made his club debut on April 3rd, 1960, in Round 1. As Manly's Captain in 1964, Barry concluded his playing career with another 80 First Grade games. Barry and his two older brothers Ron (1948) and Wally (1951-52) were also Manly Captains.

### Dennis Ward (1947 - 2021) Player #185

Dennis was the halfback and member of Manly's first Premiership winning team in 1972. He played for the Sea Eagles from 1968-72. Nicknamed "Menace" he played 93 graded games for Manly: 80 First Grade, 9 Reserve Grade, 4 Third Grade. He made a pre-Season debut for the Club on March 20, 1968, playing in the Semi Final of the Wills Cup. He made his First-Grade debut in Round 1 of the 1968 Season on March 31. He played in the 1968 Grand Final and in 1972 earned the Man of the Match award in the Sea Eagles' first Premiership win. Dennis represented Australia between 1969 and 1972, and for New South Wales between 1969 and 1973.
